It is inspired by the Parable of the Sower. A bible story of a farmer who sowed some seeds with different degrees of success. The seeds that grew best were those that fell on good soil, had strong roots enabling the plant to grow and produce a good harvest.

In the context of our school values and ethos our vision statement captures the idea that the children learn and understand what our values are, start to put them into practice in our school and the wider world until they reach a point when they are living them out without thinking.

For this to happen we have established a broad and balanced curriculum that sets high aspirations for academic progress and achievement and, just as importantly, a curriculum that offers opportunities to develop their character through engaging activities and experiences beyond the classroom.

For some children, their academic development or ability to live out our values don't come easily and we are committed to making sure they are nurtured in ways that still enable them to flourish.

By establishing strong roots and giving them opportunities to reach upwards and outwards, inside and outside of the classroom, we will enable your children to flourish in everything they do. I hope that you find the newsletter reflects our new vision statement in all its glory...





# Murphy

This term in Murphy Class our topic has been 'Houses and Homes'. We have enjoyed creating homes out of a variety of materials as well as learning about different types of houses that we may find in Standlake. This term has also seen the start of our Forest School sessions where we have been bug hunting, building a hedgehog home, threading bird feeders and exploring the Forest School area.

During Literacy, we have been exploring lots of stories including Goldilocks and the 3 bears, 3 Little pigs and Last Stop on Market Street. We have been retelling the stories using Tales Toolkit, story maps and puppets. In Maths, we have been beginning to look at the number formations as well as patterns around us and have made some superb patterns using the classroom resources.







## Donaldson Class

Donaldson class have had a great first term thinking about the adventures of Paddington. We created 'Wanted' posters for Paddington, with members of our class certain they had found clues and evidence of Paddington around the school! We all know how much Paddington loves marmalade sandwiches, so we wrote instructions for how to make them, as well as some more unusual sandwiches of our own!

We explored the features of the different countries in the UK, looking at the 4 capital cities. We created some of the famous London landmarks using junk modelling and also discussed the mystery of the Loch Ness Monster.

As part of our science lessons we enjoyed a morning with Mrs Costar who gave us lots of information about looking after animals and answered our questions about her job as a vet.







### Blake Class

Wow, what a busy term we have had in Blake class. We have been learning all about Ancient Greece and have made our own Greek stories and Greek vases. We have learnt a lot about the Olympics including how competitors used to compete naked. All the children were relieved that this has changed.

We have also been learning about sound in science and completed our first experiment to see which material was the most absorbent. Linking to this we went on our first trip to Winchester Science Centre and Planetarium.



In English we wrote our own sets of instructions and some children even managed to follow their own instructions on how to make a pizza – the rest of the class got to eat it! They were delicious!







# Dahl Class

We have had a great term 1 in Dahl class. Ancient Greece has been our topic meaning we were able to make Greek vases using clay, as well as write instructions on how to train our very own mythological creature, just like Leo the Greek hero did in our story. We concluded that if our creatures are bribed with plenty of treats, they will be trained in no time...

We had great fun acting out scenes from the Trojan war. From the Greeks arriving for battle, to men hiding in a big wooden horse. We would have been such good warriors!! Almost as powerful as the Spartans!

In science we have been learning all about sound and how our ears work. We carried out an experiment to see what materials absorbed sound the best, which made us question whether we could soundproof our rooms when we play our cornets too loud...







# Morpurgo Class

This term, Morpurgo have been taking a tour through time, learning all about the interesting and sometimes horrific methods of crime and punishment. We started the term with a 'detective day,' where children walked in to find a crime had been committed. They had to use clues to eliminate suspects. Children wrote a newspaper article to report their findings. We have used the class text 'Street Child' to inspire a setting description, balanced argument, and diary entry. Children have also enjoyed learning about multiples, cubed numbers and square numbers in maths.

In science, we have been engaging with the topic of 'forces.' Children have deepened their understanding of gravity and air resistance through experiments. Morpurgo have learned what makes a good experiment and how to start formulating their own questions. In art, children have been exploring different artists that link with the time period of our topic lessons. Children particularly enjoyed creating glass-stained windows which can be seen displayed on the windows of the classroom. In P.E., children have been learning to play tennis and continued to develop their swimming skills. The improvements and confidence in the pool from these children are a delight to see! We can't wait to get even better next term!







# Shakespeare Class

Crime and Punishment through the ages has been Shakespeare class' fascinating (and at times gory!) topic this term. We have learnt about various methods of punishment throughout history, considered which were the best, and fairest, deterrent and concluded with a thought-provoking balanced argument in English: Is capital punishment ever right?

Mrs Abraham has inspired us with art linked to the different periods that we have been learning about, including Renaissance portraits and stained-glass windows using tissue paper. In Science, we have considered healthy lifestyles and the circulatory system – dissecting pigs' hearts was a memorable highlight... for most of us! Finally, we have loved our Monday afternoon dance sessions under the expert tutelage of Mrs. Isard – thank you.
