Achievements in Term 5







Murphy Class, Mrs Harrison writes: This term we have been learning all about space through our topic 54321 Blast Off! We have found out lots of information about planets, stars and space travel. The children have loved listening to some fantastic space themed stories. We began with Whatever Next where we role played the story and wrote lists about what we would take to the moon. We then read about Mae Jenison, the first black female to go into space, and how she became an astronaut. We talked about how we can achieve amazing things if we really, really try. The children wrote about what it would be like to be an astronaut.

We had a brilliant week learning all about stars, where we read the wonderful book Mole's Star. It is a great story about how a mole takes all the stars into his burrow but then realises none of his friends can enjoy them anymore. He then says sorry and all the other animals help him put the star back in the sky. This provoked lots of discussion about how important it is to say sorry and that others forgive you and you can help put things right. We also looked at the famous picture Starry Night by Van Gogh. The children spent a long time looking at the picture, talking about the different parts of it and how it made them feel. They created some amazing masterpieces of their own in that style.

We have also had super fun making and playing in our very own space station. The children particularly love the jetpacks! In Maths, the Reception children have been learning their number bonds to 10, about odd and even numbers and how to share amounts out. Nursery children have been describing and naming 2D shapes, using positional language and comparing groups of objects-counting how many there are and seeing which group has more or less.







Donaldson class, Miss Morton writes: This term we have been learning about the Aztecs. We have enjoyed looking at different primary sources in History to learn about the daily life of an Aztec: their achievements, challenges and the Spanish Conquest. We also found out that the Aztecs admired chocolate (just like us!) because it was valuable. We have also had a brief lesson in History of Art where we have looked at some paintings of the Aztec community and learnt about what the pictures represent in order to create our own piece of Aztec art.

In Science, we have been building on our knowledge of materials by discussing the suitability and properties of each material. We have investigated what would happen if we used a material for something that it is not suitable for... we discovered that our science books are definitely **NOT** waterproof! In DT, we have been inspired by the Aztecs admiration of chocolate. With Mrs Mitchell, we have been planning, designing, and creating our own chocolate bar. We weren't sure Mrs Mitchell's white chocolate and pepper bar would be that popular though we liked the creativity! We spent an afternoon tasting and evaluating our chocolate (more tasting), turning Donaldson Class into a chocolate factory. In English, we have been using our phonics and reading skills to read *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*. In Writing, we have been produced character descriptions and a very detailed book review. As a class, we have thoroughly enjoyed listening to the story every day and predicting what might be coming next. Donaldson's new favourite quote must be "Violet, you're turning violet!"

We finished the term with the overnight camp. A great experience to be a part of, especially staying overnight away from home. Donaldson Class have achieved many things this term especially the Year 2s who have worked extremely hard to complete their end of KS1 quizzes – well done ©







Dahl Class, Mrs Fleet and Mrs Conroy write: Our fascinating topic this term was Baghdad. We have learned about how Baghdad became the centre of science, culture and invention during the Golden Age of Islam. We enjoyed creating posters to persuade others to choose either Ali or Abu Bakr as the first caliph after the death of Muhammad and we all worked really hard on writing a non-chronological report about early Baghdad.

As a class, we read 'Azzi in Between' by Sarah Garland. We considered the experiences and feelings that Azzi may have had if she arrived as a refugee at Standlake. To help with using descriptive language for the different senses, we explored the school field, with some of us wearing blindfolds!

We have learned a huge amount about electricity during our Science lessons this term. We now know how electricity is used in our everyday lives, the different parts of an electrical circuit, including switches, and which materials are good electrical conductors and why.

Following on from our previous learning about Buddhism, we focussed on the eight-fold path this term. We discussed our understanding of 'good choices' and whether it is easy to avoid harming people and things. We enjoyed making our own concertina booklets to illustrate the eight practices of the eight-fold path.







Morpurgo class, Miss Bridgeman writes: This term, we have been learning about the Kingdom of Benin! The children have really enjoyed learning all about this fascinating culture and the wonderful artwork that the civilisation produced.

In English, we began by looking at the creation story of Benin. Inspired by the magic of the story, the children had a go at writing their own myth about the creation of Benin. I have been so impressed by their creativity and their story telling skills! Having learnt so much about Benin, we then went on to write non-chronological reports.

The theme of the Kingdom of Benin continued into our artwork this term with Mrs Lee and the children loved making masks inspired by those created for the Oba!

In Science this term, we have been learning about electricity. We have tried to take our learning outside as much as possible and we had a great time pretending to be electrons carrying the energy to the bulb! We have thought about where electricity comes from and how it is used in our everyday lives, as well as which materials are conductors and insulators.

The highlight of this term must be our residential. The children had a fantastic time at Adventure Plus, taking part in archery, canoeing, and fencing amongst many other activities! Thankfully, the weather was kind to us, and we didn't end up camping in the rain! The children have learnt so much from this experience and it has been a great opportunity for them to develop independence whilst making wonderful memories.


