Overall, we are delighted with the outcome of our Ofsted inspection. It has been wonderful validation for our drive for the children to be strengthened from the knowledge and values we teach them, so they strive to learn and live in a way that leads to them flourishing in all they do!

Ofsted consider 5 key areas during the inspection that inform an Overall Effectiveness judgement. Outlined below are some highlights from the report for each of the areas:

Behaviour and Attitude: "Outstanding"


- Personal development is a real strength of the school.

- Rapid catch up supports those pupils at risk of falling behind.



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Leadership and Management: "Good"

- Leadership is strong and ambitious for the school and its pupils.
- Leaders have high expectations and want children to excel.
- There is a strong safeguarding culture.

Overall Effectiveness: "Good"

- There are highly positive and warm relationships between pupils and staff.
- This is a very inclusive school.
- Pupils understand differences and accept them openheartedly.
- Pupils support and look after each other.
- Pupils demonstrate respect, tolerance and understanding of each other's differences.
- There are clear systems in place to identify and support pupils.
- There is a positive culture that ensures staff feel well looked after and valued.
- Staff feel there is a real collaborative nature about the school and one member of staff echoed the sentiments of others by saying, 'I love working here!'

What does the school need to do to improve?

Subjects such as computing, music & art should be planned and implemented to the high standards evident in other subjects so that pupils receive a consistent quality of education across all subjects.

Our reflections

It is wonderful to have earned such a positive Ofsted report and to have come so close to receiving 'outstanding' judgements across all areas, but for the depth of knowledge in a few subjects. However, we know that in those few subjects, the children do share in an enthusiasm, curiosity, and joy which is not able to be captured in the limiting nature of an Ofsted framework!

It is testament to the wonderful staff that I have the joy of working alongside every day that we got to where we are today. They are tireless in their passion and commitment to do the very best for the children and work. So it is to them that I say a huge THANK YOU!

Achievements in Term 4







Murphy Class, Mrs Harrison writes: This term, we have been learning about lots of traditional stories. We have learnt to retell the main events in a story and join in with the repeating language in stories such as The Gingerbread Man and The Three Little Pigs. We have explored the different characters in the stories and the children came up with some fantastic descriptions for the Big Bad Wolf! When we were learning about Little Red Riding Hood we created some maps to show the deep dark wood. We then had lots of fun using some programmable toys to move across our maps and used positional language to say where they were. When reading Jack and the Beanstalk we focused on growing and have learnt about the life cycle of a bean. The children have all planted their own bean and have observed what happened as it started to grow.

In PSED we have been finding out about how to keep ourselves healthy. We have learnt about why it is important to brush our teeth and to eat a healthy diet.

We have also been busy scientists this term, learning about which objects float and sink, exploring the best materials to build a house out of and how materials can change when they are heated such as ice, eggs and porridge.

We have learnt about the Easter story and why the main symbols of Easter remind us of new life.







Donaldson class, Miss Morton writes: This term, we have been learning about extreme weather. We've been able to watch real life clips of lightning, flooding and ask geographical questions about this. We even got to watch Miss Morton frying an egg on her car last summer in the extreme heat! During these Geography lessons we have used our knowledge of ever-changing weather to discuss climate change and what it means. We enjoyed listening to the story *Greta and the Giants* and made the link that the giants were not helping fight climate change! Every morning, we have been keeping up to date with the weather in Standlake by watching the news as part of our morning routine. We have learnt about different weather symbols and how Carol and Stav present the weather using a clever clicker! We have made fantastic progress in Phonics and Reading this term. We have been using our phonics to produce some wonderful writing. Because we read *Jack and the Beanstalk* in Murphy Class, we decided to read *Jack and the Baked Beanstalk* – an alternative version of the traditional tale. We really enjoyed comparing the two stories, writing character descriptions, and building on vocabulary.

We have been amazing scientists this term! All of us have been working in small teams to come up with a scientific question which is important to ask, from *Is branded soap or cheaper soap better to kill germs?* To *Can you taste flavour blindfolded?* There were lots of scientific learning happening in Donaldson and for some of us, it was our first time making a poster about our investigation. Well done Donaldson Class!

In DT, we linked our learning with our PSHE; Healthy Me! With Mrs Mitchell, we have been learning about different food groups and the importance of staying healthy. We have then designed our own lunchbox to show we have understood our learning. We were very lucky to also discuss the art of *Guiseppe Arcimboldo* who created portraits out of fruit... it was interesting and strange...







Dahl Class, Mrs Conroy and Mrs Fleet write: This term, our topic this term has been 'Europe'. We learned about how Europe fits within the continents of the world. We then learned about European countries, flags, mountains, rivers, cities and landmarks. We particularly enjoyed exploring different options for a travel itinerary around Europe.

As a class, we have read 'The Butterfly Lion' by Michael Morpurgo. From the perspective of Bertie, we wrote a diary entry about the first time he saw a white lion cub from his compound. We then had some very interesting discussions about whether animals should be used in circuses and we wrote our own balanced arguments.

In Maths, we have been developing our multiplication skills, plus rising to the challenge of working out fractions of amounts and exploring equivalent fractions. We have also learned about properties of shape, including angles and symmetry.

Our Science lessons this term have been lively and fun. Mrs Conroy was very brave letting us plan and carry out our own experiments. We have made good progress with our understanding of the concept of a fair test and have loved creating our posters to show our results, including graphs created using google sheets.

In RE we learned about the story of the calling of the first disciples. Reverend Jo was impressed with our knowledge and understanding of how this story helps us to understand the kind of world that Jesus wanted. We asked Reverend Jo lots of questions about her job.

In art, linked with our Europe topic we have been looking at architecture from different countries. We created our own collages of Spanish buildings and created pointillism for the Eiffel Tower.







Morpurgo class, Miss Bridgeman writes: This term, we have been studying the topic of 'Europe'. We have researched the countries of Europe and practiced our atlas skills to mark these on the map, as well as looking at the topographical features.

In English, we have loved reading our class book, 'Rooftoppers' by Katherine Rundell. We have created setting descriptions from Sophie's point of view as she looks out over the city of Paris from her rooftop. To finish off the unit, we have written persuasive leaflets about Paris, encouraging people to visit the city.

We have been very busy in Maths this term - we have looked at calculating area and perimeter of shapes, adding and subtracting with money and converting between units of measure, before rounding off with a review of our fractions work.

Our science lessons this term have been devoted to 'The Big Science Event'. The children were very excited to get stuck in and investigate their own questions – interestingly, we had a lot of food related questions! The class have produced some amazing posters and have shown that they have been able use their 'working scientifically' skills. In RE, we have been learning about the story of 'The Calling of the First Disciples'. We have thought about what kind of world Jesus would have wanted and the actions we can take to make the world a better place. We also thought about the role of the church and church leaders. We very much enjoyed our visit from Reverend Jo and we had lots of questions to ask her!

In art with Mrs Lee, the children have created their own Gaudi inspired buildings from cardboard and mod rock. The creativity we have seen is incredible and the children have certainly enjoyed getting their hands messy with the mod rock!

We have also had a special visit from Oreo and Ginger this term! Everyone got to try holding one of the guinea pigs and some children had a go at feeding them. We discovered Oreo is a greedy little piggy!







Shakespeare class, Mr Brown and Mrs Abraham write: This term, we have enjoyed learning about the Shang Dynasty – one of the earliest periods of history from which we have written records, thanks to the discovery of the Oracle Bones. We have learnt about the lives, beliefs and hierarchical system of governance of the people who lives in China at this time.

Philip Pullman's imaginative 'Firework Maker's Daughter' has been our inspiration for our creative writing – we have written diaries and added a chapter to the text, giving the main character Lila another obstacle to overcome.

For Year 6, our Yenworthy residential was undoubtedly the highlight. Coastal climbing, dune-surfing and a stunning scramble at Valley of the Rocks will live long in the memory for us all.

Back in the classroom, the Big Science Event has allowed us to plan, carry out and report findings of experiments that were of particular interest to us – many of which involved food, sweets or sugary drinks!

Mrs Abraham has inspired our Chinese artwork, as we have created kites and saltdough dragons, while 'What difference does the resurrection make to Christians?' has been the thought-provoking question in our RE learning. Our cricket and clarinet skills have continued to progress, thanks to cricket coach Joe and Miss Bridgeman respectively.

Wonder Wednesday

Our weekly Wonder Wednesday assemblies focus on local, national or international topical events that are taking place at the time. Each week we ask 'The Power of 3' questions to help children focus on the topic and come away knowing more, remembering more and doing more as an outcome of the new learning.

Please make sure all outstanding payments for school lunches are paid before the start of term.

Free School Meals

You can get Free School Meals for your child if you or your partner gets either: Universal Credit, Income Support, Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income-related Employment and Support Allowance, The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit, Child Tax Credit, provided you are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income of £16,190 or less, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs. If you think you might be be entitled to free school meals please contact the school office for a Free School Meal form. If your child is in Reception, Year 1 and 2 they will receive the universal free school meals. However please still let the office know if you think you are entitled to free school meals because it will provide the school with additional funding.

Summer term for Mr Denham
